A first — ABC-VF offers Piloting as online course

This fall ABC-VF has two courses underway.

The first is the virtual Piloting course (Marine Navigation) which began on Sept. 21. It has three students enrolled and will be running for nine weeks. Course chair is P/C Russ Jones.

We are fortunate to have Russ in the lead because he has many years of experience in teaching the course. Jim Heckman and Nick Montalto are his assistants. This will be the first time we have taught Piloting totally online.

Russ is inventing some new approaches and



The second course in progress is virtual Navigation (Celestial Navigation). Approximately 15 students are enrolled. Jim Heckman is the course chair. Three of our members — Bill McManimen, Nick Montalto and Sam Lyness — are assistants.

Its first lecture was given in July. The second lecture was presented on Sept. 22, which allowed the students time to use their sextants to meet the requirements for the course. Again, this is a virtual course. All elements of it, except the sight-taking sessions, are presented online.



Speak up to keep Brewerton range lights

The Coast Guard 5th District is proposing to discontinue the Brewerton Channel Eastern Extension Front Light (LLNR 8390) and Brewerton Channel Eastern Extension Rear Range Light (LLNR 8395).

Their stated reasoning is that there are other means of navigation that can be used. My family and I have sailed that route many times during our 50-plus years of sailing that area of the Bay, and find those nav aids very easy to use.

I feel that they are particularly important for the safety of our newer boaters who may not be as skilled at navigation. Here's one case in point: <u>https://chesapeakebaymagazine.com/twoboats-strike-channel-markers-on-upper-bay-insame-weekend/</u>

The Amtrak Railroad Bridge over the


Susquehanna River will be maintained in the closed position until Oct. 6, 2020. The vertical clearance in that position is reported to be 52 feet.

Work continues on the overhead highvoltage transmission line on the Patapsco River north of the Francis Scott Key Memorial Bridge between Hawkins Point and Sollers Point. Work is scheduled for 24/7 until Oct. 7, 2022. The work boats may be contacted on VHF-FM channels 16 and 13 should there be any questions during transit of the area.

The Coast Guard 5th District is proposing to rename and renumber these aids to navigation in the Middle River:

- Middle River Light 5 to Middle River Light 3
- Middle River Light 6 to Middle River Light 4
- Middle River Daybeacon 7 to Middle River Daybeacon 5


ABC-VF members give \$750 in aid to combat coronavirus and hunger

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Remembering Jim Spaulding, a man of many talents

[Editor's note: Jim Spaulding passed away recently. A member of Main Line Sail and Power Squadron for many years, he served in many capacities, including Educational Officer in 2009-2010. He also received numerous awards, including the Craig Muckle Award, 110%, New Member, and Award for Excellence in Teaching. Here's one friend's remembrance.]

We will remember Jim for his warm smile and easygoing ways. Jim always had a smile, and you could tell that it was genuine. He never seemed irritated or upset, and he was always fun to be around.

Jim was a great, longtime Power Squadron member. Although he had many irons in the fire, Jim always found time for Main Line. And for that, we very much appreciated his service.

Jim had many talents — sailor, engineer, inventor, craftsman, and educator. His love of sailing led him to spend many hours, months and years rebuilding Rose. Rose was a packet sloop destined for the scrapheap when Jim and his wife, Cheryl, laid eyes on her. The passion to repair the old lady was immediate. Jim not only completely refurbished Rose, but wrote and published a book, "Rebuilding Rose," describing her rebirth.

Jim also wrote and published a science fiction series and a dramatic novel.

He enjoyed teaching and taught a number of courses and classes for the Power Squadron, including Marine Electrical Systems, Engine Maintenance and our basic safe boating classes.

He earned his doctorate of education at Penn State University, where he was an associate professor. His doctoral thesis was about a way to teach adults the boating rules of the road using

props he developed for the students to use in class. It was designed to be a fun activity that would help adults remember the rules when out boating.

Jim and Cheryl chartered a narrow boat (canal boat) in the UK and shared exploits from their experience at a squadron dinner meeting. (If you have never maneuvered a 50' long, 8' wide boat through dozens of 9' wide locks using a tiller, it's not for the faint-hearted.) At another meeting he regaled members with an update on Rose.

We all miss you, Jim; you were a good friend, and great guy to hang out with.

A funeral mass will be held at 11 am Oct. 3 at St. Joseph Church, 332 Manor Ave., Downingtown, followed by a get-together at the Spauldings' home. Cheryl has invited squadron members to come to either or both.

Vessel Safety Checks included PWCs this year



This has been a strange year for our Vessel Safety Check committee, thanks to Covid-19. We weren't even allowed to begin to do inspections until July 6, when the US Coast Guard approved their resumption for our area. And then we proceeded cautiously.

While we will not approach our tally from last year of well over 100, we have done pretty well under the circumstances.

Between Chris Dome, John Juzbasich and myself, we have made 37 inspections so far, and may still pick up a few more.

We examined quite a variety of vessels -sailboats and powerboats in the 25' to 50' range, smaller runabouts, several kayaks and canoes, and --- a first for our squadron-- two PWCs! As part of the recent virtual USPS Fall Conference, there was an excellent session on Vessel Safety Checks offered by Dave Fuller,



As Dave said, the virtual audience was probably many times larger than an in-person one would have been in Raleigh! He responded positively to a request by participants to have a similar session presented in the spring, at the opening of the next boating and VSC season.

A 'free boat' is anything but a free ride for its restorer



If anyone tries to give you a free boat, don't fall for it. I acquired a "free" boat, motor and trailer several years ago, and, believe me, it's not really free. In fact, it cost me a pretty penny. But I am getting ahead of myself. Let me go back to the beginning.

In early March of 2007 I discovered that someone was looking for a home for a 1965 Larson boat with an Evinrude 50 HP motor and trailer. When I saw this offer I thought that it might be a fun project for me and my son, Eric, to work on in our spare time. And, if we ever completed the project, Eric would have a boat to have some fun with.

I went to pick up the vessel, about 10 miles from my house, and when I first saw it I thought, "It doesn't look so bad". But when I got it home my opinion started to change. It was apparent that it had been sitting outside, uncovered, for a few years. It was full of leaves and plant debris, and also full of ice and snow. All of the lights, cleats and attachments had been removed and placed in a five-gallon bucket, which happened to be full of frozen water, i.e. ice. I couldn't tell what I had until I thawed the ice cylinder and freed the artifacts inside it.

The seats were lying sideways or upside down in the cockpit, along with a bunch of miscellaneous parts, and the remnants of a bimini

> top made of old, crusted vinyl. My optimism really took a hit when I began to inspect the transom. It was in bad shape, very rotted with a big curve in it. The 50 HP outboard hanging on it was distorting the transom and it looked like it might just fall right off.

I inspected the rest of the boat and decided to try and prioritize my repair activities to

minimize the cost and avert wasted effort.

My plan was simple: Work on the boat first to see if I could fix it before I attempted to get the engine running. If I couldn't make the boat safe and usable I'd have no use for the outboard. And to fix the boat I needed to accomplish the following:

1. Repair or replace the transom

2. Rewire the navigation lights

3. Repair/re-glass the side compartment shelves

4. Paint or recondition the gel coat

5. Install indoor/outdoor carpet-

6. Install the seats


ing

All of this seemed do-able except for the fact that I have never done any fiberglass repair work or repaired a boat transom. But what the heck, this never stopped me before. Back then, YouTube wasn't a thing so I had to research and figure this out myself.

I built a stand out of scrap lumber and managed to heft the outboard onto it and then went to work on the transom.

Since the boat had an engine well at the stern I couldn't easily do the repairs from the inside, so I decided to remove the fiberglass skin at the transom and start from there.

Using a router, I carved a groove around

the transom skin and was able to remove that section in one piece. The wood in the transom had rotted to the point that the fiberglass had stopped adhering to the transom wood.

There was a lot of rotted wood that had to be chiseled out, along with a couple of carpenter ant colonies. I left a channel all the way around

into which I would slide the replacement transom boards.

For the transom, I used plain old exterior plywood as I couldn't find a source for marine ply locally. I made a pattern and cut two, ½-inch boards in the correct shape. I coated both sides and edges with epoxy to seal the wood. The transom had a slight curve, so I applied the epoxy and, before it set up, I slid the boards into the channel and they took the correct shape as the epoxy set.

Now it was time to re-glue the skin to the transom, again using epoxy, and then fill in the space from the router bit to seal up the transom so this wouldn't happen again for a long time. I used clamps and also screwed the skin back on to hold it in place and I went back later and filled the screw holes with epoxy.

When the weather broke, I took the boat outside to paint and clean it up. After removing the windshield and all the other attachments, I gave her a paint job and tried to get the colors as close as possible to pictures of Larsons I found online.

After reinstalling everything, it looked pretty good.



I never could get the Evinrude to run without overheating, so I put on an old 65 HP Mercury and took her out for a ride.

I don't have the Larson anymore, but it was a fun and educational winter project.
